3rd Sudbury Group Chairmans' Report

I am delighted to report that the Group have had another successful year. Demand for all our Sections remains buoyant, and we are privileged to have a splendid team of Leaders and Helpers ensuring that all our Members receive a programme of activities that inspires, challenges, and educates.

The year-end accounts report a similar situation to last year in that we have sustained a modest deficit. This has been caused by our desire to keep subscription increases to a minimum coupled with the impact of general cost of living increases and the cost of essential repairs. As with last year, our reserves have ensured we have enough in the pot to cover our costs, as well as being able to support the Sections with their financial needs.

Whilst talking about our reserves, we have agreed a reserves policy of maintaining our General Reserve at a level equivalent to 18 months of our premises costs. After adjusting for the exceptional cost of the new boiler, our general reserve is on target. We are also aiming to maintain a Building Reserve of £20,000. We remain materially short of this target, but will endeavour to build this reserve when funds allow.

Cathy Challis, in her report, has called out the excellent work that her leadership team have achieved. I should like to add a huge thanks to both Steve and Cathy Challis for their ongoing enthusiasm and commitment to the success of the Group. They undertake a crucial role within the Group, and we are all very fortunate that they continue to bring their considerable experience to the Group.

A key component of the Group are the Executive Committee members who manage the physical assets and the finances. As we head into 2024, I am pleased to report that the Committee remain professionally focused on the success and prosperity of the Group. Each Member brings a unique perspective on the matters that we have addressed in the last financial year, and as I look back over my tenure in office, I genuinely believe that we continue to grow the organisation in a positive and sustainable way. I should therefore like to thank all the Members of the Executive Committee for their sterling work over the last 12 months.

3rd Sudbury D Pack Cubs Annual Report

We currently have 21 paid up Cub members. Megan is the section leader, I am assistant Cub Scout leader with Paul, Jim, and Simon all section assistants. Issy and Will often turn up to provide additional help with activities. Evie and Maddy have now turned 18 but plan to be a Uni or travelling later in the year so they will be occasional helpers. Our Young leader James is still helping regularly and working towards his D of E.

As you can see by our Accounts, they continue to look healthy, and we have made an effort to spend some of the money. The account started with £762.98, and we are finishing with £228.15. This is possible a little lower than we would like to go forward but we had some large expenditures in March/April. We have had three payments for Subs, this was in May, September, and January.

One of the major expenditures continues to be badges and scarfs. We have also done several cooking activities which turn out to be more expensive when you are purchasing specific ingredients to cater for pack members with specific allergies and intolerances. This also effects catering during Cub camps as well and needs to be factored into future budgets.

Last Summer we had a 2-night District Camp in Essex. It was a very hot weekend and we joined with C Pack so there was a large amount of expenditure for the catering. We also did a 2-night Halloween camp at Bradfield Scout Camp in November. During the camp we did Pumpkin carving, braiding and used the Grass sledges and dark maze at the site. In December we had a 1-night Winter camp down at the Scout hut. One of the activities during this camp was visiting the Christmas Tree festival in the Church where we left a donation.

We have done lots of cooking activities, pancakes where made and consumed on Pancake Day. We also made Scones which were enjoyed with cream and Jam (Cream first as I am from Devon!!) We did fireworks in November with Hotdogs and Hot Chocolate being served. We also did a 'Smoothie' night. It was so impressive the different healthy combination that were created and drank.

Paul ran a brilliant creative evening. All the Cubs received their own sketch book and used inspiration from Quintin Blakes's illustrations. It was great to see how simple outlines can be so effective. We are hoping that the Cubs have continued being creative and adding to their sketch books.

The last major activity for the financial year was making Bird Boxes. Jim organised this activity and fortunately we had a lot of parent help over the two evenings it took to build the boxes. Jim sourced all the wood and materials from B&Q, unfortunately there was no discount available locally and the bill was £190.00. It worked out that each box was just under £10 each. You will see from the pictures on our Facebook page that some of the bird boxes have been hung and we are hoping that some birds will move in over Easter.

Sudbury Scouts

Through 2022 the Scouts have been developing their navigation, map reading and compass skills. They then demonstrated all they had learnt on different hikes, where they had to navigate to different check points without getting lost.

In the summer the Scouts spent time on the water building rafts, playing in kayaks and canoes, using the Zorb ball and water trampoline. Some Scouts took the opportunity to learn more about capsizing and rescue skills in kayaks at the local swimming pool.

We've also had first aid training and used the skills they learnt on a first aid incidents night around Sudbury. The Explorer unit generously offered their support by creating first aid scenarios where the Scouts treated them as casualties, bandaging them, using the recovery position and demonstrating CPR. They even had a member of the public comment on how good it was to see young people learning such great skills.

Scouts have also turned their hand to a bit of DIY, using tools to make a wooden mobile phone holders and learning about electrical circuits.

Through the year Scouts have learnt about fire lighting, making feather sticks and learning safe use of knifes, saws and axes. This gave them valuable skills ready for

the bush craft camp which took place in October, where they cooked on fires, had a go at archery and camped in hammocks under tarps.

This is just a small selection of activities the Scouts did during the year and have an exciting 2023 programme to continue enjoying, with them having already completed their first camp of the year.

3rd Sudbury Sea Scouts 2022-23 Report

It's been a busy year for our section and back to normal at troop nights and camps. Our numbers in the troop have been around 24 all year and troop nights are usually well attended.

We lost Ben Appleby as a leader and Charlotte Stiff is now working in Greece most of the year, but have some new helpers (Will Champken, Anna Miles & Ben Turner). With higher leader numbers, we are hoping to expand the troop size to 28 or so this coming year.
